Celiac disease (gluten-sensitive enteropathy), sometimes called sprue or coeliac, is an immune reaction to eating gluten, a protein found in wheat, barley and rye. If you have celiac disease, eating gluten triggers an immune response in your small intestine.

People with celiac disease may have 1 or more of the following symptoms. Gas, belly bloating, and pain that does not go away. Diarrhea (loose stool) or constipation (hard stool or trouble passing stool) that does not go away. Pale, foul-smelling, or fatty stool. Weight loss or weight gain. Tiredness ...

Celiac disease can present with many symptoms, including typical gastrointestinal symptoms (e.g., diarrhea, steatorrhea, weight loss, bloating, flatulence, abdominal pain) and also non-gastrointestinal abnormalities (e.g., abnormal liver function tests, iron deficiency anemia, bone disease, skin disorders, and many other protean manifestations).

This multisystem disorder is caused by the body's immune system reacting to proteins in wheat, rye and barley. In 2011, they published a paper in The American Journal of Gastroenterology describing results of a double-blind, placebo-controlled re-challenge trial involving 34 patients with IBS. Celiac disease is an immune-based reaction to dietary gluten (storage protein for wheat, barley and rye) that primarily affects the small intestine in those with a genetic predisposition and resolves with exclusion of gluten from the diet. There has been a substantial increase in the prevalence of celiac disease over the last 50 years and an increase in the rate of diagnosis in the last 10 years.

The diagnosis of celiac disease requires several steps: the patient, while eating gluten, contacts their health care provider; the clinician has the diagnostic consideration of celiac disease; serologic testing is ordered, most appropriately a tissue transglutaminase IgA antibody (tTG IgA), often combined with or followed by an anti-endomysium IgA antibody, particularly in children; and, if serologic testing is positive, an endoscopic duodenal biopsy is performed.
