Dental Considerations. Duchenne affects orofacial muscles (muscles of the face and the mouth) and influences orofacial function (chewing, swallowing, etc.). There is a high prevalence of malocclusion (the incorrect relationship between the teeth of the upper and lower dental arches as they approach each other when the jaw closes). An increased expansion of the lower dental arch, compared to the upper dental arch, may result in open bites (the lower and upper teeth not coming in contact with ...

Dental Considerations - Parent Project Muscular Dystrophy

Before starting dental treatment, dentist has to assess the presence of hypertension and accordingly the treatment changes needed. Patients with hypertension are at increased risk of developing adverse effects in a dental office. Therefore, measuring blood pressure (BP) will be done in the dental office to every new patient for each visit.

Patient placement; ideally, dental treatment should be provided in individual patient rooms, whenever possible. For dental facilities with open floor plans, to prevent the spread of pathogens there should be: At least 6 feet of space between patient chairs. Physical barriers between patient chairs.

Dental considerations in asplenic patients

Have the patient avoid rough-textured foods and report oral problems early. Xerostomia/salivary gland dysfunction: Advise the patient to soften or thin foods with liquid, chew sugarless gum, or suck ice chips or sugar-free hard candies. Suggest using commercial saliva substitutes or prescribe a saliva stimulant.

Clinical implications: In most patients with RA, the condition will necessitate few or no changes in routine dental care.
